"Pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people." —Ephesians 6:18

This is a wonderful verse from the New Testament. It reminds me to keep on praying for all of you. I hope that you pray for me as well! Since the sermons have been about prayer these last few weeks, I thought it would be good to say some things about prayer in this fashion.

What if you had a friendship with someone you could call any time, night or day? A friend who met with you regularly and allowed you to talk non-stop for ten, twenty, thirty minutes—or more—and never asked you to stop? Or maybe you just send out a quick call or text now and then, and no matter what, that friend was always there to answer. Suppose as well that this friend reached out to you to give you guidance, support, love, and encouragement even when you didn't call and ask for it first.

You would feel deeply loved by that friend, right? Happily, that's a description of how any of Christ's followers can approach God.

Prayer is a mystery. God is all-knowing. We can't tell him things he doesn't already know. And he is sovereign—working and weaving everything everywhere together to accomplish his perfect eternal purposes. These truths make us ask: Why do I even need to pray?

And yet, for reasons we can't fully understand, God commands us to pray: "Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful" (Colossians 4:2). Furthermore, God tells us that our prayers are eternally significant: "Confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The earnest prayer of a righteous person has great power and produces wonderful results" (James 5:16, NLT).

Now here is one more thing I think people often wonder about:

"In the name of Jesus, amen." Praying "in the name of Jesus" means more than mindlessly tacking that phrase on to the ends of our prayers. Biblically, a name represents all that a person is and stands for. Doing anything in a person's name means to do that thing as if he or she were doing it.

To pray in Jesus' name means praying the kind of prayers Jesus would pray. An "in the name of Christ" prayer should reflect who Jesus is—his person and works.

I hope this month's emphasis on prayer has been a blessing to you!

Lilly Frields was selected as a Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship recipient to study abroad.

Frields will spend nearly a month in Rwanda completing research with the guidance of Amy Spears, associate professor of music. Their project seeks to better understand how Rwandan music teachers are integrating music into the healing process of individuals living with HIV.

"Due to the 1994 Rwandan genocide, a large number of Rwandan citizens are now HIV positive," said Frields. "A prevalent force working with genocide survivors - and helping to facilitate our research - is Musicians Without Borders." Musicians Without Borders is a nonprofit based in The Netherlands which uses music to inact social change. The organization works with individuals and communities that have been impacted by war, conflict and displacement.

"Many individuals need to travel to the capitol city to receive HIV treatment, requiring them to take off work, leave their children, and interrupt the normalcy of their daily lives," Frields stated. "Musicians Without Borders aims to make their journeys even more valuable by offering music classes." Frields hopes to gain a deeper understanding of music's power to build community and aid in the healing process through her participation in music classes and interviews with music teachers and genocide survivors.

The Gilman Scholarship is a nationally competitive program that assists students with study abroad expenses. The program aims to diversify the students who study and intern abroad and the countries and regions where they go. The scholarship is sponsored by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs. Frields is one of 64 NWU students to receive the Gilman Scholarship since the program began in 2001.

"In my future career, I plan to conduct psychological research while exploring music as a method of healing; specifically, I'd like to explore how music can be a complimentary medicine to battle Alzheimer's, a disease which has personally impacted my family."

Frields is a junior psychology major with minors in music and biology. (Nebraska Wesleyan University – Lincoln) She is a graduate of Nebraska City High School. (information obtained from the Nebraska Wesleyan University website)
