Halloween is remembered this month on the 31<sup>st</sup>. In spite of the practice nowadays of thinking of Halloween as the Devil's night, Halloween is actually a holiday with rich religious origins. The "Hallow" in Halloween comes from the same root as "Hallowed be Thy Name." Halloween is the day before the traditional Christian celebration known as All Saints' Day. It was intended to be a "hallow(ed) e'en," "a holy evening."

Our tradition in which we think of ghosts and trick-or-treating seems to have come from Celtic beliefs. The Celts believed that the souls of the departed roamed the earth one night in the fall. Since it was a time of harvest, the people would huddle together in front of fires, eating, and telling stories. And thus Halloween evolved into a celebration of witches and ghouls and fiends far removed from All Saints' Day.

There is a story about a creature that appeared at a widow's door one Halloween. She called it the scariest creature she'd ever seen. The rubber mask, covering the young person's face and head, had twisted features, a pulled-down mouth and a bright red "wound" on the cheek. Quickly, the widow dropped a couple of home-baked cookies into the young person's sack and the scary creature hurried away.

A couple of days later, when the paper boy came to collect, he said, "Those sure were good cookies you gave out on Halloween!"

You guessed it. He was the young man behind that mask. The woman could hardly believe it! Darren my paper boy is a real sweetheart she says, good-natured, polite, working to become an Eagle Scout.

Did you ever wear a mask on Halloween? For a brief time, it can be fun pretending to be something that we are not.

But remember that in real life, God does see behind the mask. It troubled Jesus that the Pharisees taught one thing and did something else. Here's why that bothered Jesus so much. The Pharisees were in places of responsibility. They were the spiritual leaders of their community. If they taught one thing and did something else, what would that say to those who were looking to them for guidance?

The same thing is true of us. If we have given our lives to Christ, we have a responsibility. That responsibility is, with God's help, to make our deeds match our words. We are not only to talk the talk, we are to walk the walk, even if it is nothing more than sharing a few freshly baked cookies.
